Hello PBC Family,

I ran across an intriguing title of a book: *Jesus > Religion – Why He is so much better than trying harder, doing more, and being good enough*. I have included a little about the author and an excerpt from the book coming out this month. Shalom!

Abandon dead, dry, rule-keeping and embrace the promise of being truly known and deeply loved.

Jefferson Bethke burst into the cultural conversation in 2012 with a passionate, provocative poem titled “Why I Hate Religion, But Love Jesus.” The 4-minute video literally became an overnight sensation, with 7 million YouTube views in its first 48 hours (and 23+ million in a year). The message blew up on social-media, triggering an avalanche of responses running the gamut from encouraged to enraged.

In *Jesus > Religion*, Bethke unpacks similar contrasts that he drew in the poem—highlighting the difference between teeth gritting and grace, law and love, performance and peace, despair and hope. With refreshing candor he delves into the motivation behind his message, beginning with the unvarnished tale of his own plunge from the pinnacle of a works-based, fake-smile existence that sapped his strength and led him down a path of destructive behavior.

Bethke is quick to acknowledge that he’s not a pastor or theologian, but simply a regular, twenty-something who cried out for a life greater than the one for which he had settled. Along his journey, Bethke discovered the real Jesus, who beckoned him beyond the props of false religion.

Not Your Mom’s Jesus

Once I began to realize the packaged Christianity I grew up with didn’t tell the whole story, I began to see this dangerous Jesus everywhere in Scripture. I would come across passages that completely confronted my sanitized Christianity.

Jesus was borderline homeless?

Jesus called people sons of the devil?

Jesus actually told his disciples they needed to physically follow him not just sign a card and raise their hand?

Jesus told people they couldn’t be a follower of him until they took up the most brutal torture device ever invented, the cross?

One of my favorite verses can be found in the book of Isaiah: “All of us have become like one who is unclean, and all our righteous acts are like filthy rags.”¹² We often miss that our “righteous acts” are “filthy” before God. Not just our bad days, but our extremely good days too! Praying, reading the Bible, giving to the poor, and going to church nine times a week? Filthy rags apart from Jesus and his cross. Tell me that isn’t just a little bit controversial.

And if that God isn’t shocking enough for you, author Francis Chan shares in his book *Crazy Love* that the Hebrew word for “filthy rags” can be interpreted as “menstrual garments.” In that verse God says our good works are no better than a bloody tampon. Next time you’re in a public restroom and you see the waste can, feel free to remind yourself that’s your righteousness apart from Jesus. This abrasive message wasn’t just from God the father either. Jesus delivered his fair share of one-liners to the most religiously zealous of his day—“hypocrites,” “brood of vipers,” and “murderers.”¹⁴ Would this Jesus get kicked out of your church or criticized on your blog for not being gracious or kind enough? And don’t you find it interesting that some of Jesus’ harshest words were reserved for the most devout religious people of his day? You would think he would condemn the bad sins of marginalized people of society such as prostitutes, drug dealers, and tax collectors, right? Instead, speaking to the religious leaders, he says stuff like, “Truly, I say to you, the tax collectors and the prostitutes go into the kingdom of God before you. For John [the Baptist] came to you in the way of righteousness, and you did not believe him, but the tax collectors and the prostitutes believed him.” If that won’t make a religious person faint, I don’t know what will.

Jesus hung out with the most marginalized and disrespected people of society, and he was fiercely opposed to anyone representing him in a hypocritical way. His words should not only shock us but also make us fear, because they were written just as much to us Christians today as they were to the religious leaders of his day, the Pharisees. I certainly have focused on outward appearance and made extra to-do lists to add to my salvation, all while neglecting the simple needs of others. I’m often more Pharisee than saint. I’d rather people tell me how awesome I am than how awesome Jesus is. I’d rather concentrate on other people’s sins before I look at my own. More often than not, I sense the toxic Pharisee spirit rising up within me.

The Bible isn’t a rule book. It’s a love letter. I’m not an employee. I’m a child. It’s not about my performance. It’s about Jesus’ performance for me. Grace isn’t there for some future me but for the real me. The me who struggled. The me who was messy. The me who was addicted to porn. The me who didn’t have all the answers. The me who was insecure. He loved me in my mess; he was not waiting until I cleaned myself up. That truth changed my life, and I’m convinced it can change yours.

Mission Far from Impossible

Of all of the mission projects named specifically in the annual budget of Philippi Baptist Church, the farthest away and having the most unusual story is Bacone College.

Oklahoma's very first college, then called Indian University, began classes in early 1880. Enrollment totaled three students. A year later it was chartered by the Muscogee-Creek Nation, with its purpose stated as to provide Christian education for American Indians under the auspices of the American Baptist Home Mission Society. This agency governed the school until the late 1950s, and the tie is still strong.

By 1893, enrollment had reached 703 in the college and the preparatory school, with students coming from six Indian nations—Cherokee, Creek, Choctaw, Seminole, Wichita, and Kiowa. In 1910 the name was changed to honor the American Baptist missionary, founder, and first faculty member and president, Almon C. Bacon. In 1885 the campus moved to land donated by the Muscogee-Creek Nation in Muscogee. The main building was named for John D. Rockefeller, who donated ten thousand dollars to the institution. Interestingly, that building, called "Old Rock," was dismantled in 1938, but much of the material was reused in the building of Memorial Chapel.

In recent years, emphasis has been placed on recruiting Indian faculty and staff and in developing courses in Indian culture. Like Alderson-Broadus the school is known for offering the first nursing degree in the state. Buildings on the campus include the Ataloa Lodge Museum and the McCombs Gallery, which together house an impressive Native American art collection. Outstanding alumni include Richard "Dick" West and Woody Crumbo, artists who originated the style which has been known as the Bacone School of Art. Another alumnus and artist who is also an award-winning author is Eddie Chuculate, whose best-known book is *Cherokee Madonna*. Alumnus Enoch Kelly Haney serves currently as Chief of the Seminole Nation of Oklahoma and was a State Senator from 1986 to 2002, a member of the State Legislature before that. Another artist and sculptor, he designed "The Guardian," the statue on top of the state capitol building. Patrick Hurley, a soldier, statesman, and diplomat, and Alexander Posey, writer and humorist, also graduated from Bacone, as did Don Chandler, kicker and punter, a member of the Halls of Fame of the University of Florida, the New York Giants, and the Green Bay Packers.

What brings the mission very close to home is the fact that a beloved member of Philippi Baptist Church, Gary Wagner, left the staff at Alderson-Broadus to join the staff at Bacone. Thus, this effort begun by American Baptists, home to one of our own, is still of our prayerful concern.

The theme this year for the Every Member Canvass is "**The 3:10 Principle**" Pastor Jon has suggested that we take our guidance from Malachi 3:10 - "Bring the whole tithe into the storehouse, that there may be food in My house, test Me in this and see if I will not open the floodgates of Heaven and pour out so much blessing that you will not have room enough for it."

I am asking you to help us continue and expand the ministry of our Philippi Baptist Church. You can do this in two ways. First is by contributing to our general operating fund. And the second way is to volunteer your time and talent. The nominating committee is currently looking for members to staff our church boards which oversee the various ministries. However, we are also in need of people to help in other ways. We need two more church van drivers to share Sunday driving responsibilities. We always need help in the church nursery or for wee church. There are many needs out there and there and I am sure each of you has a talent that could be used to fill those needs.

I would like to review receipts and expenditures for last year and compare them to estimates for this year. In 2012 we collected \$155,000 and spent \$158,000. Last year we increased our budget for 2013 by \$15,000 in three areas. This was to fund: \$6800 for building improvement, \$4300 for salaries and benefit increases and \$4000 for youth activities. This included increases for camping, Backpack Ministry, Code Blue and VBS. Right now, our estimated collection for this year is \$159,000 and estimated expenses \$170,000

As you can see, our expenditures have increased faster than our collections. We have been blessed to have some savings to help us through this time. However this is not sustainable. Now the church boards are meeting this month to review their budgets and we will have a challenge budget ready for next month's business meeting. I know that some boards have plans to increase their budgets for some very worthwhile ideas. So at risk are not only some of the new ministries that we have started this year but also new ones being envisioned for next year and beyond.

Next Sunday, November 3rd, we will ask members and friends of the Philippi Baptist Church to make their commitments. We also have Time-Talent Inventory forms available for you to indicate your desire for in service opportunities. These forms will be available in the vestibule this week and next week and they may be placed in the offering plate. Please consider the words from Malachi as we seek to open the floodgates to serve our neighbors here in Philippi and throughout the world, through the Philippi Baptist Church.
